

Tax Deduction

lease be informed that membership dues, paid at the state as well as the chapter level, are tax deductible for the calendar year and subsequent years. Deduct your dues as a charitable contribution under authority of IRC Section 170 (assuming the person paying the membership dues itemizes their deductions when computing their federal net taxable income) or as a business deduction under authority of IRC Section 162 (assuming the person paying the membership dues has a "trade or business" and the payment of the membership dues is directly related to this "trade or business"). When making a donation, ask for a receipt.

Your volunteer mileage is also deductible. Make copies of your volunteer hours logs with mileage for your taxes.

Let's Talk About BCHW's Accounting Peculiarities

024 saw a resurgence in all forms of financial scams; BCHW was no exception! In a month's time, I get several emails from Dana, Jason Ridlon and Kathy Young asking if I am around and if I could pay an invoice, wire money to an account and my all-time favorite buy gift cards and send any of them the numbers. This last year, some of you received emails purported to be from me asking you to use your personal funds to buy gift cards and send me the numbers. Under no circumstances will I or any BCHW officer email you to ask you to buy gift cards or spend your personal funds on anything for BCHW. I ask that you NEVER forward suspicious emails to me or whoever is asking you to send money. DELETE those emails immediately; do not open attachments. They can have malware attached, and you could infect anyone whose computer you send those emails to. Be safe and delete all suspicious emails, then call the person on the phone and ask if they are asking you to do that.

Let's talk about BCHW accounting and what I call BCHW accounting peculiarities. Nonprofit organizations are all different, and BCHW is no exception! With the ever-increasing amount of

grants, contracts and agreements that BCHW (state) administers each year, I must make sure I have enough cash on hand to process all the reimbursements and credit card purchases requested, then wait for the various grants, contracts or agreements to reimburse BCHW. This is becoming more and more challenging and impacting BCHW's treasury as the amount of funds that BCHW retains each year has not significantly increased year over year for the last several years. These funding streams close out in the fall each year. Because of various trail work and match lags, I process many reimbursements that require a significant amount of liquidity, which can impact liquidity balances during the months of August through October each year. It is truly watching our dollars to ensure that the grants, contracts, and agreements do not impact BCHW and the chapter's other financial commitments.

If you have any questions, please call me at 253-709-5052; I do not want any misinterpretations or information floating about. In the next THN, let's discuss the importance of accurately recording Volunteer Hours and In-Kind donations.



Janet Jones is Coming to Rendezvous!


uthor of 'Horse Brain, Human Brain', Janet applies brain research to the training of horses and riders.

- 10:00am "You've Seen That a Million Times!" Equine brains cause horses to shy from tiny changes that human brains do not notice. An automatic process called categorical perception allows us to group different items together and treat them all the same. Horse brains don't have that process, so each item is considered new and different. By exploring differences in categorical perception, riders can anticipate and reduce shying.
- 2:00pm Buddy-Sour: Managing Over-Attachment Between Horses Some horses whinny frantically and gallop the fence-line back and forth when their best buddies leave for even a few minutes. Why does this separation anxiety occur, and how can owners reduce the problems it creates? This talk explores the complex social hierarchy among horses, why it exists, and how modern stabling impedes it. We turn then to applied techniques for preventing and correcting herd-bound behavior.

- How brakes work (different kinds)
- Changing a tire (?-for the ladies), the easiest way. Block/ramp to roll up on. Be sure to have tire changing tools (know where to find them). What if lugs don't come lose what to do. AAA or US Rider assistance hazard triangle or flares (when to use them).
- Defensive driving tips include control of a trailer hauling live weight.

Objectives met:

Maintained* 9.7 miles of trail:

- 1. Home Sweet Home Trail from Home Sweet Home Camp to Upper Duckabush Camp.
- 2. Duckabush River Trail from Upper Duckabush Camp east to Lacrosse Pass trail junction.
- 3. Upper Duckabush Camp to Marmot Lake and beyond to both O'Neil Pass and Hart Lake junction.
- 4. Bottom half-mile of Lacrosse Pass Trail.

*Cleared logs (to stock standards on trails rated as such), hand brushed, retreaded and tended drainage in critical locations. Logs cleared numbered nearly 100.

This trip would have been impossible without stock support, as our work started at Home Sweet Home, nearly 15 miles from the trailhead up and over First Divide. We are immensely grateful to BCHW members Rachael, Matthew, and Harold for making this extremely difficult trip so that we could maintain these deep backcountry trails.

After a typical summer's dry spell, we got dumped on with an unexpected cold, hard rain. The packers were loading when we left the trailhead, and they had to drop off their camp and horse feed below First Divide. Then they encountered ground hornets, which dispersed their herd, and the trail from 9-Stream to First Divide and then down to Home Sweet Home is difficult, to put it mildly. Steep and rocky and now, also wet. The packers and their animals were working extremely hard, and the crew members,

who had arrived hours before, were waiting, freezing and wet, bouncing around, trying to stay just this side of hypothermia.

Home Sweet Home is an iconic and lusciously beautiful camp, perhaps even more so in the misty fog. You can see the entire basin from First Divide. The camp is the site of an old shelter, long since gone, nestled at the back of a gigantic meadow overshadowed by Mt. Steel and Mt. Hopper and filled with sub-alpine snow-squished curvy firs worthy of a Dr. Suess starring role.

We were working in the heart of some of the most jaw-dropping scenery the Olympics have to offer, deep into the backcountry, chainsawing and getting tread back to snuff. The O'Neil Pass basin is the headwaters of the mighty Duckabush River. Trickles of water in a huge open meadow suffice as the "river." Like all rivers in the Olympics, though, in a short distance, this becomes a raging, deep and cascading body of water, unsafe to ford for much of the year. It's a reminder of how spectacular the Olympic National Park is and how lucky we are to be able to work on these trails. Getting our equipment to this remote location would be impossible without BCHW packers.

On the last day, we all exited from Upper Duckabush Camp and hiked 17 miles out. After many hours, the packers arrived, and we learned that there had been an incident. Thankfully, all heartbeats were fine. Possi had slipped off the trail on some switchbacks out of camp, which sent him sliding on his belly and then tumbling. He tumbled down several switchbacks with the manties still attached to him. One flew open, which the Tullers had to re-collect and re-pack once they had gotten Possi back on the trail and ensured he was okay (He was! Phew!). Rachael and Matthew, as always, dealt with the situation expertly. They were all smiles when they showed up at the trailhead.
